Enrollment in the Graduate Department.

A fair increase in the membership of the Graduate Department is shown in the catalogue of that department, which is now in type. Last year there were 170 students but this year the number is 213, which is an increase of 37. Last year 31 men took the degree of Doctor of Philosophy, and 6 the degree of Master of Arts. Outside of these about seventy per cent. of last year's students returned for study, while the remainder are new students. An increase of three is noted in the number of women enrolled.

One hundred and twenty one of the 213 students now in the Department graduated from Yale. Eighteen have received degrees both at Yale and at other colleges. The rest graduated from the following institutions: Smith College, 7; Vassar, 5; Cornell, 4; Harvard, 3; National Normal University, 3; Pomona College, 3; Gettysburg College, 3; Wellesley College, 2; Wesleyan University, 2; University of Michigan, 2; Boston University, 2; Augustana College, 2; University of California, 2; Tulane University, 2; Bucknell College, 2; Hamilton College, 2, and one each from the following: Williams College, Bethany College, Illinois College, Union College, Bellevue College, Euphrates College, John Hopkins University, Drury College, Carleton College, Adelbert College, Kansas State University, Amherst College, Pennsylvania College, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Yadkin College, Trinity College, University of Iowa, Marietta College, St. Louis University, Gates College, Hobart College, Welch Presbyterian College, N. W. Onashita Baptist College, Indiana College, Gymnase de Geneve, (Switzerland), Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Columbia College, University of Kansas, Imperial University of Japan, Colby University, Wittenberg College, Demson College, Leipzig, Vanderbilt University, The Doshisha, Japan, Bates College, Gustavus Adolphus College, Rochester University, Mt. Of the members 206 have taken degrees as follows: Bachelor of Arts, 132; Bachelor of Philosophy, 40; Bachelor of Science, 9; Doctor of Philosophy, 6; Master of Arts, 5; Bachelor of Divinity, 5; Bachelor of Letters, 2; Civil Engineer, 2; Master of Science, 2; Mechanical Engineer, 2; Bachelor of Laws, 1.

Of foreign institutions there are three graduates, who have taken a course of study equivalent to that for which the Bachelors degree is given in this country.
