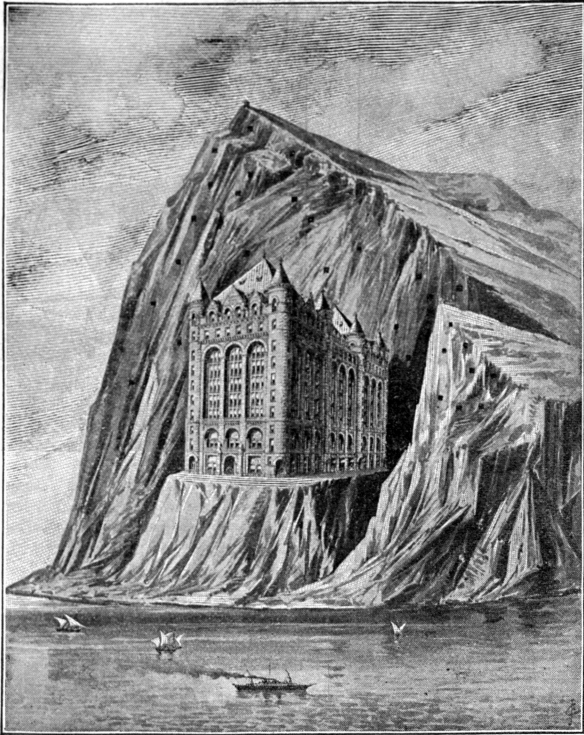

More Yale Volunteers.

The Yale volunteer contingent at Camp Haven, Niantic, was augmented by thirty-one men last Monday, on the arrival there of the First Division of the Naval Battalion, C. N. G., and the Engineer's Division, of this city, under Commander E. G. Buckland, '89 L. S. The two divisions, numbering 119 men, responded to a call for volunteers from Washington and moved at once to their rendezvous at the State Camp. There was great enthusiasm when the Reserves marched to the train accompanied by the entire strength of the local militia.
