The Freshman Eleven.

Only two games yet remain for the Yale Freshmen eleven, one with the Princeton Freshmen, Saturday, Nov. 18, and one with the Harvard Freshmen, Saturday, Nov. 25, at Cambridge. The team has not been very successful in its preliminary season of seven games, having lost four of them. When the schedule was prepared in the Fall ten preliminary games were on the list, but the first three, through one cause or another, had to be cancelled. The lightness of the material for most all positions was another drawback. At present the line plays too high and is easily bowled over, and the kicking is very weak. G. W. Hubbell, 1900; A. Townshend, 1900 S.; C. T. Dudley, 1900 S.; B. C. Rumsey, 1902, and J. R. Swan, 1902, have been coaching the team.
